Talks at Recent Meetings

June 20th The RN Submarine Service in the 70s

It's been a while since we had a talk from one of our own but this was a presentation by one of our members on his service in nuclear submarines. Starting with his 5 Year Apprenticeship and 1 Year Submarine Training, leading on to work as an Electrical Artificer. We heard about life on HMS Dreadnought (with its American propulsion plant) and then HMS Revenge, one of the deterrent submarines carrying nuclear armed Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles. There were many questions asked by those present, ranging from the

nuclear technical to domestic routine. Answers were comprehensive although avoiding anything which might still be deemed to be classified.

August 15th Model boat building by the Gloucester Model Boat Club

Our first Club Night Meeting in two months! It was a splendid presentation by members of the Gloucester and District Model Boat Club. Ted Tedaldi (an MSRVS member) brought model boating friends with some of their boats and associated equipment. The evening gave a comprehensive and interesting insight into a well organised and studied hobby.

The participants all had different approaches to the hobby both in prototypes modelled and construction methods used. Materials included wood, fibre glass and plasticard, but, almost universally it seems, the two stroke diesel and glowplug engines of the past have been replaced by very powerful and efficient brushless electric motors.

Blue Lias

There is also a water supply in the corner of the field and Chris Stubbings arranged for the essential toilet facilities.

Food at the pub is very good and the place is popular so we saw a steady stream of pub customers wandering into the field to look and chat. They also have camping facilities in another part of their site.

The bigger engines went on a road run on the Sunday, about 1½ miles to a pub which also seemed to get favourable reviews.

All in all a very good weekend, aided by excellent weather of course, and certainly one worth putting in diaries – and well done to Chris for this year!
